

Since 2017, HRO's mission has been to observe, document and denounce the daily state violence perpetrated against people on the move at the Franco-British border.* Due to recurring hindrances to our observation work, the following figures should be taken as an extreme minimum.

Numbers concerning evictions from informal living sites:



At least **1 eviction of 1 informal living site**



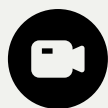
At least **67 unaccompanied minors** encountered**

Occurrences of intimidation and/or systemic violence endured by people on the move recorded by HRO :

- On **November 20**, a large-scale eviction took place in the Dunkirk area. **National police vehicles** were present, along with **15 CRS** (Compagnie Républicaine de Sécurité) **vans**, **6 vans from the PAF** (Police Aux Frontières) and **2 buses with the AFEJI** (organization appointed by the State to manage "sheltering").

Due to an abusive "safety" perimeter, HRO's observers were unable to monitor the course of the eviction and, as a result, could not gather information on the number of people arrested, the number of people taken onto the buses, whether individuals were forced to board onto the buses, or on the seizures and destruction of property.

Occurrences of intimidation and/or hindrances experienced and recorded by HRO and other organizations:



On **November 20**, during the interactions between the police and the observers, they **were filmed without being notified**. A police officer also **took a photo** of HRO members **with his phone**.

- On **November 20**, the "safety" perimeter established by police officers was **abusive**, as it completely obstructed the observations of the eviction.
- The members of HRO and another association were stopped by the police and **had their identities checked and recorded**. Police officers also **examined the exterior condition of HRO's car**.



* Our data are based on our observations and are therefore not exhaustive.

** Number of self-reported UFM's met by an association not mandated by the department that provides support to Unaccompanied Minors in November 2024 while they were on the street. This number is an under-representation of the number of children living on the streets because outreach activities are not carried out daily in all living areas by these players; some children do not communicate with the community workers; others access shelter directly via the association mandated by the department and are therefore not included in this figure. One observation remains: repeated dismantling operations are a source of increased vulnerability or even disappearance for these children, and therefore of increased risks of trafficking and exploitation.
